London, today. An anonymous call thrusts a rookie investigator, June Lenker (Cush Jumbo), and an experienced policeman, Daniel Hegarty (Peter Capaldi), into a vicious battle where each side strikes blow for blow. The stakes are to uncover the truth about a case judged ten years ago, a femicide, which Lenker believes the culprit is not who everyone thinks.

Criminal Record is the meeting of two magnificent actors. The scenes pitting Cush Jumbo against Peter Capaldi were unanimously hailed, rightly so, as great moments of television by critics. We knew from the first days of shooting that it would be like this. It was important for me to offer them a setting worthy of their talent. Through extensive preparation and location scouting, we managed to provide an original and realistic vision of London. It was also essential that everything we shot in the studio be absolutely compatible with these exteriors. Participating in the creation of a show is a great responsibility. You are responsible for all the visual aspects that will accompany the series throughout the season and any potential future seasons. It's a lot of pressure but also a great satisfaction when you succeed.



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If we find the characters that made the success of the first season, the Wallaces and the Dumanis will have to face new adversaries. Episodes 3 and 4, directed by Marcela Saïd are mainly focus on the resurrection of Sean Wallace (Joe Cole), left for dead at the end of season 1, and his return to the upper echelons of London gangsterism. Surrounded by his brother Billy (Brian Vernel) and his mother Marian (Michelle Fairley), he will be aided by Lale (Nargues Rashidi) and the Kurdish community in direct confrontation with Koba (Waleed Zuaiter), the new king in town.

When we find Sean, he is locked up in a prison somewhere in Eastern Europe. Tortured by his captors, Sean overcomes these trials and gradually rebuilds himself. The first fifteen minutes of episode 3 brilliantly depict this transformation. I chose a visual treatment reminiscent of the great paranoid films of the Seventies. By moving the character away from London, the story plunges us into a visually off-kilter space, thanks in particular to the extreme accuracy of the sets. Similarly, when the two brothers regain control of the street, I chose a realistic treatment without exaggeration. The violence they display speaks for itself...

At the initiative of Jo Cross (Keeley Hawes), three families decide to take their vacation at a resort in the Canary Islands. The day after their arrival, the hotel is attacked by two terrorists. Two members of the group of friends, Chinar (Vikash Bhai) and Ben (Daniel Ryan), are killed. These events uncover an extramarital relationship between Jo and Chinar, plunging the survivors into complex psychological turmoil.

Crossfire is a three-episode mini-series. While the first two episodes depict the hotel attack by two young terrorists, the third is dedicated to the aftermath. The mourning, the recovery, the explanations, and sometimes, the confrontations. The treatment is completely different. Where we used handheld cameras, realistic lighting in the first two episodes, we decided to use a studio mode and much more sophisticated lightning. The characters are filmed in static shots. The length of the shots is extended, allowing the characters time to express their emotions, their distress. From Crossfire, I particularly enjoyed working with all the actors, like a true theater troupe. It was physically demanding when we accompanied them as they tried to escape death. A respectful distance as we assisted them in their attempt at resilience afterward. Crossfire had very good viewership on BBC 1.

The city of London is being torn apart by the turbulent power struggles of the international gangs that control it and the sudden power vacuum that's created when the head of London's most powerful crime family is assassinated.

Thanks to the drive of Gareth Evans and Jude Poyer (the stunt coordinator), Gangs of London is an extremely spectacular and violent show. Xavier Gens directed these three episodes. Beyond the action scenes, he particularly explored and delved into the psychology of the characters. The scripts weave complex relationships between the characters. Alliances, betrayals, love stories, and hatred. The challenge was to include these long dialogue scenes without deviating from the dynamic style of the early episodes. Especially at the end of episode 7, there is a sequence where all the characters gather around a table, engaging in a heated discussion where the two clans oppose each other. We shot it on location, with three cameras. A real challenge. We managed to shoot the 7 pages of the script in 3 hours. Almost entirely in close-ups to emphasize the expressiveness of the actors. Gangs of London will remain unforgettable for my first shooting experience in London.


PHOTOGRAPHY EXHIBITIONS SUMMER 2023
